





1. The month of Elul

The Jewish month before Rosh Hashanah is called *Elul*. During this month, we think about our behavior and actions from the last year and decide on changes we want to try to make in the coming year. Download a family "*Elul* inventory" for your family at jkidphilly.org/elul_inventory

2. What's in a name?

In Hebrew, Rosh Hashanah literally means "head of the year" or "first of the year." Rosh Hashanah takes place on the first and second days of the Hebrew month of *Tishrei*.



3. The "Birthday of the World"

Rosh Hashanah is also known as the "Birthday of the World." A "birthday" is something that children can relate to! Talk about how children receive presents on their birthdays. What present would you like to give the world this year?

4. Apples and Honey

5. Round Challah

7. The Shofar



The Shofar is a ram's horn that is blown like a trumpet during the Rosh Hashanah service, and at the end of Yom Kippur. There are three different sounds of the shofar. Hearing the shofar blast can remind us to do our best in the new year. Listen to the shofar here: youtu.be/nkWEG3PmgZA

Then try making your own shofar sounds:


tekiah - one sort blast shevarim - three short blasts teruah - nine short blasts

8. Synagogue

Going to synagogue on Rosh Hashanah is one way to take time to think about how we behaved last year and what we want to change about ourselves in the new year.

9. Tashlich

Traditionally, on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Jews go to a body of water and toss crumbs of bread to symbolically throw away (*tashlikh*) the things we did wrong last year so we can start again.
